# SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING - TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 4, 2018, 1:59 pm

<u>O-355-18</u>		Approving the revision of the current Collective Bargaining Agreement between the City of Toledo and the Toledo Firefighters Association, IAFF Local 92, for a successor agreement, consistent with the bargained understandings; and declaring an emergency.
<u>B</u>	<u>3ody:</u>	SUMMARY & BACKGROUND: The City of Toledo and the Toledo Firefighters Association, IAFF Local 92 ("Local 92") reached a tentative agreement over terms that revise the current collective bargaining agreement, which expired on December 31, 2017, for a successor agreement, for the new term of January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2020. The Union ratified that tentative agreement on August 23, 2018. Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code section 4117.10(B), the economic provisions of that agreement are now being submitted to City Council for consideration and passage. If not acted upon within 30 days, the agreement is deemed approved.
		Pursuant to the statutory bargaining process under the Ohio Revised Code, the City and the Union met multiple times during the last several months to negotiate the terms of a successor agreement.
		The tentative agreement reached provides the City with the ability to reassign six (6) Lieutenants from the Communications Bureau to line operations and civilianize those Fire Communications Bureau Shift Supervisor positions. Also, this agreement enhances the safety of the citizens of Toledo as well as the firefighters by providing a process to

achieve all four-person engines by the end of the agreement. In addition, the agreement provides revisions to the drug and alcohol testing policy to include discretionary testing for alcohol and post-accident drug and alcohol testing. Further, the agreement decreases the amount of union release time and reduces the number of members permitted to negotiate a successor collective bargaining agreement.

Regarding the economic terms, the agreement provides for a 1.5% base pay increase in January 2018, another 2.5% increase in January 2019, and a 3% increase in January 2020. Also, the agreement provides on-call pay to members of the Fire Investigation Unit, to reflect parity with members of the Toledo Police Department working in the unit. The agreement also adds Veterans' Day and Easter as major holidays to reflect parity with the Toledo Police Patrolman's Association ("TPPA.") In exchange for the civilianization of positions in the Communications Bureau, the agreement increases the amount paid into the Local 92 Career Enhancement Program ("CEP") from 51% of the amount spent on TPPA CEP to 75% in 2019 and 2020. Subsequently, by 2021, Local 92's CEP will be completely separate from the TPPA CEP. In order to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the Toledo Fire and Rescue Department, the agreement establishes a Field Training Officer/Paramedic Training Officer Program to train and mentor firefighters within the Department. Finally, reflecting the ever-increasing costs of healthcare, the agreement provides for increased contributions to the Union's Health and Welfare Fund. The City's monthly contributions will be based on the City's PEPM from the previous year.

## 2. <u>TMP-3159</u> Authorizing the Mayor to execute a memorandum of understanding regarding Toledo's fire services agreement with the Village of Ottawa Hills; and declaring an emergency.

### **Body:** SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

In an effort to promote regional cooperation and to improve efficiencies in the mutual provision of public service, the City of Toledo and the Village of Ottawa Hills (VOH) entered into a Fire Services Agreement to combine firefighting services under the control of the City of Toledo. Pursuant to the 20 year agreement, which was authorized by Ord. 17-2011 the Toledo Fire and Rescue Department ("TFRD") absorbed the facilities, equipment and full-time personnel of the VOH Fire Department. The VOH would pay the City an "annual service fee" of \$430,000, subject to adjustment based upon the Consumer Price Index ("CPI"). The agreement required TFRD to occupy and man the fire station in VOH.

TFRD has determined that it can cover VOH territory from stations located within the City of Toledo without any negative effect on the quality of service to VOH. Moreover, it is anticipated that TFRD would realize savings if it were no longer required to man a station it believes is superfluous in terms of coverage. VOH has agreed to enter a memorandum of understanding modifying the original agreement by creating a six month trial period to determine what if any impact the new coverage will have on VOH. TFRD has, subject to Council's approval, agreed to suspend service payments to the City during the trial period. It is anticipated that, should the trial period prove acceptable, an amendment will be made to the Fire Services Agreement that would make the arrangement permanent for the remainder of the agreement term and adjust the service payment paid by VOH.

The scope of work included in this contract was developed to meet and exceed the mandates of Senate Bill number 2 (SB 2) which legislated the requirements for a state-mandated asset management plan for Public Water Systems (PWS) at that time.
