**Body:** SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The City of Toledo acquired the property at 214 Dura Avenue, parcel 18-11217, in 2015 through the County Landbank in anticipation of the property becoming part of the Police Tow Lot. Other plans were made and legislation was passed in 2016 to purchase modular office buildings for the tow lot. The 214 Dura property was last sold in 1989 for \$51,000, before any building was constructed. The property was previously used for truck transportation. There are currently unpaid property taxes totaling \$74,262, for which the city has applied and expects to get full tax exemption before property transfer. The property appraised in 2018 for \$265,000. Bryson Transport Services will bring 10 jobs, invest \$150,000 in the property and add as many as 15 new jobs in the future. Bryson will purchase the property “as-is” and be responsible for any and all closing costs, fees and expenses, including title and survey work.

**Body:**

SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

This legislation provides funding for a variety of programs both for the administration of the CDBG program and programs operated internally by various City Departments and operations, Community Development

Corporations, and Social Service agencies. This legislation authorizes the acceptance, deposit, appropriation and expenditure estimated to be \$6,711,564 as well as the expenditure of CDBG carryover funds in the amount of \$1,035,000 from all years prior to program year 2019 (45th) in federal funds and more specifically, the One Year Action Plan for the 2019 Program Year to be submitted to HUD on June 25th, 2019.

The financial impact of this Ordinance is the receipt of \$6,711,564 from HUD to the City of Toledo for the administration of the CDBG Program as well as the allocation of funding to Community Development Corporations and various Social Service agencies in the Toledo community. Also, the expenditure of CDBG carryover funds in the amount of \$1,035,000 from all years prior to program year 2019 (45th).

**Authorizing the Mayor to accept, deposit, appropriate, and expend the Emergency Solutions Grant estimated to be \$606,390 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to fund Emergency Solutions Grant Program activities; and declaring an emergency.**

**Body:** SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The City of Toledo (COT) receives from the U.S. Housing & Urban Development Department (HUD) a designated Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) amount, as an entitlement city and participating jurisdiction, for the purpose of ending homelessness in Toledo. The city's receipt and acceptance of the grant amount compels it to utilize the funds within certain HUD regulations, directives, and guidelines, as well as, pursuant to the HUD approved Five Year Consolidated Plan for the City of Toledo. Specifically, the Consolidated Plan which the COT must follow is in effect from 2015 through 2020. Each year, however, the COT submits to HUD its One Year Action Plan,

describing how it will continue to implement and execute the Five Year Consolidated Plan. The City must submit the One Year Action Plan each year within the respective five year period in order to continue to receive the annual ESG allocation from HUD. In the Five Year Consolidated Plan, as well as, the 2019-2020 Action Plan, one of eight priorities is “ending homelessness”. Likewise, the Consolidated Plan and each year’s Action Plan, inclusive of the 2019-2020, specifies that the COT will partner and collaborate with the HUD designated Continuum of Care (CoC) entity for Toledo (and Lucas County), i.e., the Toledo Lucas County Homelessness Board (TLCHB), in addressing the goal of ending homelessness in the community. It is the TLCHB as the HUD designated CoC entity that coordinates the response (e.g., rapid re-housing), the resources (e.g., leveraging of several funding sources), and the responsibility (e.g., community focus/representation) for ending homelessness in the Toledo community.

This Ordinance is to authorize the Mayor to submit to HUD the 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan, accept the 2019 Program Year ESG allocation from HUD, deposit the 33rd (2019) Program Year ESG funds received from HUD into the appropriate Account Code, and expend the amount received pursuant to the Five Year Consolidated Plan, and more specifically, the One Year Action Plan for the 2019 Program Year to be submitted to HUD on June 25th, 2019.

The financial impact of this Ordinance is the receipt of the estimated amount of \$606,390 from HUD to the City of Toledo for ending homelessness in the Toledo community.

**Body:** SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The City of Toledo (COT) receives from the U.S. Housing & Urban Development Department (HUD) a designated amount of HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME) Grant dollars, as an entitlement city and participating jurisdiction, for the purpose of meeting HUD national objectives, as well as, providing affordable housing to low and moderate income individuals or families. The city's receipt and acceptance of the grant amount compels it to utilize the funds within certain HUD regulations, directives, and guidelines, as well as, pursuant to the HUD approved Five Year Consolidated Plan for the City of Toledo. Specifically, the Consolidated Plan which the COT must follow is in effect from 2015 through 2020. Each year, however, the COT submits to HUD its One Year Action Plan, describing how it will continue to implement and execute the current Five Year Consolidated Plan but within the subject Program Year. The City must submit the One Year Action Plan each year within the respective five year period in order to continue to receive the annual HOME allocation from HUD.

This Ordinance is to authorize the Mayor to submit to HUD the One Year Action Plan, accept the 2019 Program Year HOME allocation from HUD, deposit the HOME funds received from HUD into the appropriate Account Codes, and expend the amount received pursuant to the Five-Year Consolidated Plan, and more specifically, the One Year Action Plan for the 2019 Program Year to be submitted to HUD on June 25th, 2019.

The financial impact of this Ordinance is the receipt of \$2,245,266 from HUD to the City of Toledo to provide affordable housing to low and moderate income individuals and families in the Toledo community.

**Body:** SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The West Oak Walk Business Association (WOW), a business organization in District 5, submitted a District Improvement Program application for the installation of eleven (11) decorative light posts on the north side of Sylvania Avenue between Douglas and Secor to enhance the quaintness of the business district. The lights would be in addition to the current light inventory, but would be more energy efficient and would be the first decorative lights in the area. Additionally, WOW proposes upgrading the existing thirty (30) streetlights to light emitting diode (LED) lighting for aesthetics and security. The District Improvement Review Committee convened on April 4, 2019, and recommended approval of this application in an amount not to exceed \$115,320.

**Enacting a new Toledo Municipal Code Chapter 768, Pay Equity Act to Prohibit the Inquiry and Use of Salary History in Hiring Practices in the City of Toledo.**

**Body:** SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Women in the United States are paid 80 cents for every dollar paid to men, losing out on a combined total of more than \$840 billion annually. Among women who hold full-time, year round jobs in the United States, African American women are typically paid 63 cents, Hispanic women are paid 54 cents, and Asian women are paid 85 cents for every dollar paid to white, non-Hispanic men. Studies show that basing a worker's salary offer on a wage from a previous job can perpetuate the current wage inequity. Toledo City Council has determined that in order to reduce pay inequity for all, wages should be based on job responsibilities and level of experience of the applicant rather than wages earned from prior employment.
