SUMMARY & BACKGROUND: This Ordinance authorizes the mayor to execute an agreement to create the Lucas County 911 Regional Council of Government in accordance with Section 167.03(A)(5) of the Ohio Revised Code and to organize and operate a Public Safety Answering Point in accordance with Chapter 128 of the Ohio Revised Code. The Lucas County 911 Planning Committee amended its emergency plan December 10, 2019 to merge and consolidate operations under a regional council of government. Once formed and organized, all political subdivisions within Lucas County will participate in the merged 911 operation.
Executive Summary
Authorizing the mayor to accept an Ohio Statewide Search and Rescue (Water) Capability (Am. Sub. HB 166, 133th GA) grant from Ohio Emergency Management Agency in an amount not to exceed \$6,000 for the City of Toledo, Department of Fire & Rescue Operations; authorizing the deposit, appropriation and expenditure of funds into the Operation Grants Fund; and declaring an emergency.
 SUMMARY & BACKGROUND: Ohio Emergency Management Agency has awarded the Toledo Fire and Rescue department a Statewide Search and Rescue (Water) Capability grant not to exceed Six Thousand dollars (\$6,000). The purpose of this grant is to support search & rescue throughout the state by administering and maintaining the Ohio Fire Chiefs' Emergency Response Plan/System which is one of the key dispatching capabilities for search and rescue teams in Ohio. Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

This ordinance modifies an old Customer Assistance Program by adjusting terms for small loans and adds grants. Specifically, existing Chapter 933.10(a) provides loans to property owners who qualified under the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) for leaks in lateral iron pipes. The new modifications replace former subsection (a) by relaxing the HEAP requirement and identifying lead lateral service lines. Subsection (b) will remain unchanged. The ordinance additionally seeks to add a grant section via subsection (c) for customer assistance in paying water bills to avoid termination of service, subject to appropriate funding allocations.

ordinance establishes competitive rates for sanitary sewer services for the years 2015 through 2020 that will allow for the much needed improvements in order to comply with the Consent Decree that was approved by the Voters. On November 6, 2018, the citizens of Toledo paved the way for historic regional cooperation through passage of a Charter Amendment allowing the creation of the Toledo Regional Water Commission, charged with continuing to provide a safe and dependable water supply at the lowest cost for all customers. Ordinance 538-19 allowed the City of Toledo to establish an improved rate design that supports continued infrastructure investment, adds water affordability measures and ties customer costs directly to water use. This ordinance will provide sufficient funds to finish the Consent Decree construction and to pay the debt service on the construction that was financed and coincide with a similar rate structure for sanitary sewer services that now exist for water service.

8. <u>TMP-4815</u> Amending Ordinance No. 206-19 to increase the amount authorized for special assessment for energy efficiency improvements to the Imagination Station city-owned facility; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Imagination Station is working with private funders and the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission to construct an approximately 8,200 sq. ft addition to the existing facility for the development of a 300-seat large format digital theatre with additional retail and exhibit space. The project is under construction and is expected to be complete in 2020. The City is the owner of the subject property and leases it to Imagination Station.

Ordinance 206-19 authorized the city to pay a special assessment through the Northwest Ohio Advanced Energy Improvement District not to exceed \$400,000 for energy efficiency improvements to be made to the overall Imagination Station property as a part of the theatre project.

In recent months, the building's three original air handler units have broken down. Two units have been repaired while the third unit is unrepairable. The air handers are primarily used for the building's air conditioning system and are nearly 34 years old. The average life expectancy of an air handler unit is 15-20 years. The cost to replace all three air handler units is \$700,000.

The administration recommends that to further assist the theatre project and the improvement of the overall Imagination Station property, that the city agree to pay an assessment on the property for energy efficiency improvements to be made to the facility and financing through the Northwest Ohio Advanced Energy Improvement District in a total amount not to exceed \$1,100,000. Additional approval of assessments at some point in the future by Council will be necessary to

effectuate this.
This Ordinance requests authorization for necessary agreements to allow the construction of the Imagination Station Theatre project and expansion to move forward.

portion of the Subject Property. This restoration project will re-establish the stream channel and remove sediment caused by on-site and upstream erosion with the goals of preventing flooding, improving water quality, and enhancing wildlife habitat for Ottawa River watershed.

As depicted in Exhibit C, the Subject Property is located south of the developed, frequently used, portions of the park and does not include the track, ball diamonds, playground areas, tennis courts or pool. These assets will be retained by the City. The Subject Property will be purchased and improved using a Clean Ohio grant from the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA). As a condition to be eligible for this grant, applicants must control the real property to which improvements will be made.

The Subject Property will be protected as greenspace in perpetuity. As a condition of sale Woodlawn will enter into a conservation easement with the Black Swamp Conservancy, which will prevent development and ensure the Subject Property is used as parks and open space. This Ordinance waives the competitive bidding requirements of the TMC and authorizes the sale of this property to the aforementioned entities.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The city administration and this Council have determined that it is in the best interest of the city and its residents to cause The Toledo Edison Company (the Company) to replace all of its existing streetlights on streets, alleys, and public ways in the city with light-emitting diode (LED) streetlights to enable the city to provide enhanced street lighting service and related benefits throughout the city, including increased visibility and safety for property owners, motorists and pedestrians, as well as energy efficiency and related energy and overall service cost savings.

This Council has determined that it is necessary, appropriate and advantageous to the city to approve, and to authorize the mayor to enter into, customer work agreements with the Company (the Conversion Agreements) providing for the Company to commence and complete such an LED conversion program (the LED Conversion Program) as promptly as possible and for payment of the costs of that Program to the city as incurred over the course of the Program as a separate part of the tariff paid by the city to the Company for the purchase of electricity and related services for street lighting in those years in which the conversion occurs.

Based on the replacement of up to twenty-eight thousand (28,000) streetlights and the tariff provisions applicable to the Company's Experimental Company Owned LED Lighting Program filed, pursuant to orders of the Public Utility Commission of Ohio, the aggregate cost of the LED Conversion Program to the city under the Conversion Agreements is estimated not to exceed \$5,796,000. Accordingly, this Council has further determined to authorize the expenditure from the General Fund the aggregate amount the city will pay under the Conversion Agreements as incurred over the course of the LED Conversion Program, with the understanding that a portion of the amount so expended will be reimbursed to the General Fund in ten (10) equal annual amounts from proceeds of notes issued in anticipation of the collection of special assessments levied to pay the property owners' portion of the annual costs of lighting city streets, alleys, and public ways each year for a period of ten (10) years, commencing with the calendar year following completion of the LED Conversion Program,

Due to the large scope of the assessment and implementation of the Project and budgetary constraints, the city is unable to implement the project through the employment of direct labor. In March of 2019, the Department of Public Service published a request for proposals seeking to identify vendors who could assist the city in completing the upgrades while guaranteeing energy savings. Eight buildings were selected for the initial Project based on their age, structure, and needs. After careful review and consideration of the responses received to the requests for proposal, the administration recommends entering into a Guaranteed Savings Performance Contract with Leopardo Companies, Inc.
