SECOND READING ITEMS:

O-039-20 Approving the proposal of Niki Toledo for the expansion

of their retail establishment within the Toledo Enterprise Zone; making certain findings and determinations in connection therewith; approving and authorizing the execution of an agreement and other documents, which grant real property tax exemptions; and declaring an

emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Niki Toledo I LLC; Niki Toledo II, LLC; Stanley Toledo, LLC c/o The Niki Group, LLC ("Niki") located at 3311 Secor Road, Toledo, will construct approximately 50,000 square feet of retail space in two buildings. Niki will invest an estimated total of \$12,746,560, including \$8,499,160 in real property. This expansion would have a beneficial impact on the health of the Toledo economy.

As a result of this project, Niki will create twenty-three (23) new full-time job positions and forty (40) new part-time job positions. Currently, there are zero (0) existing full-and-part-time jobs at the site.

The Remediation Abatement (defined below) will commence for Niki at the earliest date permitted under applicable Ohio law following the effective date of this Ordinance. The Remediation Abatement shall continue to benefit the parcel and the Improvement Abatement (defined below) will commence once the project is complete.

Niki has submitted a written proposal, on the form prescribed by Chapter 5709 of the Ohio Revised Code (herein called the "Proposal"). The proposal will involve new investment in the minimum amount of \$8,499,160 in real property.

The city of Toledo would grant a fifty percent (50%) tax exemption for fifteen (15) years of the assessed valuation of the Project real property prior to remediation (the "Remediation Exemption") and a one hundred percent (100%) tax exemption for fifteen (15) years on the increase in the assessed valuation of the Project real property after the remediation (the "Improvement Exemption"). The Washington Local School District ("District") has agreed to the tax exemptions provided for herein in exchange for a Service Payment, to be entered into between Niki and the District, in an amount equal to one hundred percent (100%) of what the District would have received if not for the Remediation and Improvement Exemptions. Further, in exchange for the Service Agreement, the Washington Local Board of Education agrees to waive and release any and all rights it may have pursuant to Ohio Revised Code section 5709.82 or otherwise to share in the increased income tax revenue collected by the City of Toledo and resulting from the Project.

This project is in conformance with the Toledo's Enterprise Zone Tax Exemption Policy as established by Ord. 94-95 and Ohio Revised Code section 5709.62. Washington Local School District Board of Education was notified of the application on December 30, 2019.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Ord. 23-19 authorized an upgrade of existing street lighting on Hill Avenue's western-most city limit to Byrne Road with enhanced LED street lights for the safety of citizens. Light Emitting Diode (LED) street lamps offer brighter lighting patterns at a lower cost due to less energy consumption. Increasing light intensity on Hill Ave. with LED street lights will reduce dangerous intersections and increase public safety in general.

Luna Energy Partners recommended in 2019 additional street light poles and LED lamps along Hill Ave. from the western-most city limit to Byrne Rd.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

This Ordinance authorizes Agreement between City and ISS, for access, use, enjoy, and benefit from ISS case management software in addition to their license(s) maintenance and support. The Agreement is for five (5) years at a cost not to exceed Three Hundred Thirty Eight Thousand Three Hundred 00/100 Dollars (\$338,300.00).

Authorizing the Clerk of Toledo Municipal Court to enter into an agreement with FriendsOffice, LLC for the purchase of case file folders for \$79,947.27; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

In 2019, the Toledo Municipal Court Clerk's Office processed 61,500 cases. Each case is assigned an individual file folder for all documents associated with that case. File folders are necessary for efficient recordkeeping and case processing.

The Clerk of Toledo Municipal Court solicited bids for the bulk printing of Case File Folders and Case File Inserts. The bid from FriendsOffice, LLC met the Clerk's specifications and was selected. The total bid price was \$79,947.27.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The Toledo Fire and Rescue Department's (TFRD) application for financial assistance submitted under the 2019 Port Security Grant Program has been approved in the amount of \$730,455. These funds will be used to purchase a Fire/Police vessel to be used in the port of Toledo and as a regional asset at a total estimated cost of \$973,940.

As a condition of this award, the City of Toledo is required to contribute a 25% cost match in the estimated amount of \$243,485 of non-Federal funds. The proposed Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) budget includes \$250,000 for this purchase. This ordinance requests appropriation of those funds now in order to timely begin procurement of the Fire/Police vessel. The Federal share is \$730,455 from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

3. <u>TMP-4877</u>

Authorizing the mayor to prepare specifications, accept bids and enter into price determining contracts after due advertising according to law for geotechnical testing services and related engineering services; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The City of Toledo needs testing and related engineering services for numerous construction contracts that the division administers. The Division of Engineering Services and the Toledo Waterways Initiative are two of the primary users of these services. Since numerous divisions utilize the same types of tests for their respective projects, the city has found it beneficial to have price determining contracts

established that contain schedules of prices for commonly utilized testing and engineering services. Funding for these services are contained in the various, individual, operating and project budgets authorized by council, and while singularly they represent a small portion of the projects' costs, collectively they are sizeable enough that competitively bidding contracts for these services is desirable. This ordinance authorizes solicitation of formal proposals and entering into price determining contracts for geotechnical and related engineering services from companies meeting the city's geotechnical testing qualifications.

4. TMP-4879 Declaring it necessary to improve portions of Hill Avenue by installing street lighting; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

It was determined lighting on Hill Avenue's western-most city limit to Byrne Road could be enhanced for the safety of citizens through improved street lighting. Light Emitting Diode (LED) street lamps offer brighter lighting patterns at a lower cost due to less energy

consumption. Increasing light intensity on various streets and intersections by replacing the current streetlights with LED streetlights will reduce dangerous intersections and increase public safety in general.

The total annual cost for the installation of the lighting is \$22,540 and operation and maintenance costs of the lighting is \$20,156.42 of which the city's share is \$1,322.04.

5. TMP-4846

Declaring it necessary to improve portions of Jefferson Avenue and Parkwood Avenue by installing street lighting; and declaring an emergency.

SUMMARY & BACKGROUND: The Toledo Museum of Art has req

The Toledo Museum of Art has requested that the city install LED street lighting at Jefferson Avenue (between Woodruff Avenue and Monroe Street) and Parkwood Avenue (between Monroe Street and Woodruff Avenue) to protect and provide nighttime safety to the area. The total annual cost for the installation of the lighting is \$16,896.51 and operation and maintenance costs of the lighting is \$266.64 of which the city's share is \$20.63.

6. TMP-4872

Authorizing the Mayor to enter into contracts for the purchase of capital equipment; authorizing the expenditure of \$305,600 from the Street Construction Maintenance and Repair Fund for the purchase of Asphalt Hot Box Bodies, 4-in-1 Clam Buckets, Steel Drum Roller Skid Steer Attachment, Mini Excavator Hydraulic Breaker, Hydraulic Compactor/Tamp, and Skid Steer Cold Planer attachment; waiving competitive bid provisions of TMC Chapter 187; authorizing the Mayor to accept bids and award contracts; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The Division of Streets, Bridges & Harbor (SB&H) is responsible for maintenance and repair of all streets and alleys within the City of Toledo. Street and alley pothole patching primarily use asphalt hot box trailers to haul hot asphalt. We are requesting to purchase of two (2) Asphalt Hot Box Bodies to be an addition to existing hot box trailers that are utilized on a daily basis. These hot box bodies will be on hook

lift skid frames that are compatible with existing single axle trucks equipped with a Swaploader hook lift system and will eliminate the need for a trailer to be towed.

Two (2) 4-in-1 Clam Buckets are requested to be utilized in alley maintenance and cleaning. These buckets will fit the mid-size Volvo loaders that were purchased in 2019. The buckets will give the operator the ability to pick up piles of debris and stone more efficiently in tight spaces.

The Steel Drum Roller Skid Steer attachment is requested to be used for stone alley grading operations. Last year, new skid steer loaders were purchased to be used for grading stone alleys and/or removing ruts and potholes. In order to complete the grading task, the stone needs to be compacted so that potholes do not return. By purchasing this unit, one (1) skid steer could be used to grade and compact the stone, which minimizes the need for multiple personnel and pieces of equipment in order to increase crew efficiency.

A Mini Excavator Hydraulic Breaker and a Hydraulic Compactor/Tamp attachment are also requested for the use on one (1) of the Division's existing mini excavators. These units will be utilized to break concrete and tamp the base material on utility restoration work in street and alley repairs. Current practice is to use a separate loader with a breaker attached along with a separate loader to dig. This purchase will combine one (1) machine, a trailer, and all of the attachments together, thus, making the crew more efficient.

Lastly, the purchase of a Skid Steer Asphalt Cold Planer attachment is requested for use with street repairs. This purchase will give the Division a second cold planer and allow us the ability to put two (2) crews out to make cleaner street repairs. This attachment mounts to a skid steer loader and allows the crew to mill out asphalt evenly so a clean square patch can be made.

7. TMP-4875 Authorizing the expenditure of \$48,888 from the Capital

Improvement Fund to Geo. Gradel Company for the emergency repair of the leachate collection system at the Hoffman Road Landfill; waiving the competitive procurement provisions of TMC Chapter 187; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The leachate collection system, at the Hoffman Road Landfill, has old deteriorated infrastructure that failed. Emergency services were required in December 2019 to complete temporary repairs to piping that broke and prevented leachate pumping activities at the landfill. These emergency repairs did not hold up due to the deteriorated condition of the piping, which has left the leachate collection system only partially functioning and unreliable with minimum contingencies. The leachate collection system was scheduled to be repaired by Geo. Gradel Co. on February 10, 2020. Complete failure of the leachate collection system will result in a leachate back-up at the landfill, regulatory noncompliance conditions, and Ohio EPA violations. Because of these reasons, this is deemed an emergency.

Toledo Municipal Code (TMC) 187.20 allows for the waiver of competitive bids and for the emergency work to be undertaken. Furthermore, TMC 187.20 requires Council to be informed of the emergency and for authorization to pay the repair. Sufficient funds are available within the Solid Waste CIP budget to pay for this emergency repair.

Endorsing and Supporting the Washington Local School District Safe Routes to School "School Travel Plan;" and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Live Well Greater Toledo, a diverse collaboration of community leaders and organizations working together to promote policy, systems and environmental change for a healthier community, has taken a lead role in advocating for active transportation (pedestrian and bicycle transportation) in the City of Toledo and the region.

As part of its efforts Live Well Greater Toledo has taken a lead role in obtaining Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) grant funding to develop a "School Travel Plan" for the Washington Local School (WLS) District in the City of Toledo.

The City of Toledo, Washington Local School District, Toledo Metropolitan Area Council of Governments (TMACOG) and Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) partnered with Live Well Greater Toledo in developing the "School Travel Plan".

The Travel Plan partners have collaboratively completed a review and analysis of student attendance areas for WLS District K-8 elementary schools including "walk audits" that highlighted obstacles to the use of active transportation for students to travel to school.

The WLS District "School Travel Plan" documents the results of this analysis and lists a set of infrastructure improvements and non-infrastructure education, enforcement, and encouragement

solutions to overcome these obstacles to active transportation.

The City of Toledo supports completion of these improvements and supports efforts to improve and increase the use of active transportation for school students.

Having an approved "School Travel Plan" is a prerequisite to apply for funding assistance to construct recommended infrastructure improvements and to support non-infrastructure education, enforcement, and encouragement solutions to overcome obstacles to use of active transportation for students to travel to school.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The city is in need of a software solution to create a secure environment for the collection and integration of sensitive vendor information within the financial system. Currently, banking information and other personal identifying information (PII) is gathered through email and paper forms, which have to be manually entered by city staff into the financial system. In order to achieve the desired level of security and streamline the vendor registration process, the Finance Department requests to procure a software solution that will directly interface with the city's SAP-ERP system.

This ordinance also requests the waiver of formal competitive bidding

requirements of TMC Chapter 187. The Finance Department has begun the process of soliciting informal bids for this project. The waiver would allow the city to expedite the implementation of the vendor portal as soon as possible.
