Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Shot Spotter is the global leader in gunfire detection and location technology providing the most trusted, scalable and reliable gunfire alert and analysis available today. Shot Spotter uses an array of acoustic sensors that reliably detect and accurately locate gunshots. No vendor, other than SST, Inc., possesses the comprehensive, field-proven, and patent-protected product offering, as well as the professional services and support, domain knowledge, expertise, longevity, and customer references. Only SST, Inc. can provide a true wide-area gunshot detection, location, alert and analysis solution, as well as future expansions and ongoing maintenance and support. This expenditure request is for the 2020 annual cost. The funds for the first year costs for Shot Spotter were provided by the United States Bureau of Justice Assistance Technology Innovation for Public Safety

(TIPS) grant (Ord. 442-18). This expenditure request is for the second year subscription cost.

This amendment disappropriates \$260,000 from the Capital Improvement Fund and appropriates \$260,000 from the General Fund so the total expenditure is from the General Fund.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Resolution 430-17 authorized the mayor to apply for grant and loan funds from the Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) for the Sewer Lining Project. This ordinance authorizes the mayor to enter into agreements, accept and deposit up to a \$148,000 grant and a \$148,000 loan from OPWC; appropriates \$304,000 from the Sewer Replacement Fund to pay the local share of the project; and authorizes the mayor to accept bids and enter into contracts for the project. The work includes the lining of sewers that have been found to be in poor condition during television inspections, with a resin liner, resulting in a structurally sound pipe within a pipe with minimal surface disruption. This work is necessary to maintain safe, reliable sewer service.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The Total Station Survey Robotic System purchased in 2012 needs to be replaced since it can no longer be repaired. The Trimble R12 has the ability to track three times the satellites as the current survey system along with the ability to connect to satellites in dense and wooded areas, which will allow surveys to be completed expediently, and with more accuracy. This system is available through Precision Laser and Instrument, Inc., which is a proprietary seller of Trimble products in the Toledo area. This legislation will authorize the replacement of the obsolete equipment.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Ordinance 351-17 authorized the mayor to enter into contracts for the inspection and design of the remediation to the sewer system. Resolution 418-18 authorized the mayor to apply for grant and loan funds from OPWC for the Large Diameter Sewer Rehabilitation project. Ordinance 374-19 authorized the acceptance of \$850,000 grant funds and \$850,000 loan funds along with appropriating \$1,500,000 from the Sewer Replacement Fund to pay the local share of the first phase of the project and authorizing the mayor to accept bids and enter into contracts for the project. This ordinance authorizes local funds to pay for Phase 2 of the Large Diameter Sewer Rehabilitation Project. The project will replace or repair structural problems in critical sections of the aging sewer system.

On March 12, 2020, said matter was considered by the Toledo City Plan Commission and the request for the approval of the site plan for a new retail store located at 845-885 South Avenue, Toledo, Ohio, was approved and all things required by law to be done, have been done. An appeal has been filed by Advocates for basic legal Equality Inc. on behalf of the Broadway Corridor Coalition.

The Friendship Park Community Center submitted a District Improvement Program application for the Friendship Park Community Center Improvement Project in District 6. The proposal includes the purchase of two oscillating pedestal fans for the lunchroom, the repair of the center's roof and a backup generator for a total of \$100,500. The District Improvement Review Committee convened on April 24, 2020, and recommended approval of this application in part in an amount not to exceed \$30,800. Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The Water Reclamation Plant's Secondary Treatment Facility is the heart of the treatment process. This facility was originally built in the mid 1950's and expanded in the 1970's. The Improvement I-44C Phase 1 - Inlet Gate Replacement Project is a breakout project from the Secondary Renovations Project, Improvement No. 44. This breakout project focuses on the replacement of structural, mechanical and electrical components of the Secondary Treatment Facility. This project will address the replacement of the inlet gates, stop gates hardware, control valves and related electrical and controls systems, in addition to concrete repairs. This project is critical to the operation of the Secondary Treatment Facility, because its components are essential for the isolation and maintenance of the secondary settling tanks in order to maintain compliance with the NPDES discharge permit. This ordinance will provide funding to perform the construction services of the Improvement I-44C Phase 1 - Inlet Gate Replacement Project.

Approving a Community Reinvestment Area real property tax exemption for Olympic Real Estate Group, LLC, 7551 Olympic Parkway, Sylvania, Ohio 43560, for the remodeling of a new accounting office facility, located at 5355 Southwyck Boulevard., Toledo, Ohio 43614, property in the Hawthorne Hills Community Reinvestment Area (HH); authorizing the execution of an agreement and other documents related thereto; making certain findings and determinations in connection therewith; and declaring an emergency.

Body:

SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Ordinance No. 111-17, passed on April 18, 2017, Toledo City Council (the "Ordinance") created the "Hawthorn Hills (HH) Community Reinvestment Area" pursuant to Sections 3735.65 through 3735.70 of the Ohio Revised Code. This area was subsequently confirmed as Community Reinvestment Area No. 095-77000-170 by the Ohio Department of Development on May 18, 2017.

Olympic Real Estate Group, LLC (the "Owner") has submitted an application and agreement for a CRA real property tax exemption as prescribed by Ohio Revised Code Sections 3735.67 and 3725.671. The exemption is requested for the remodeling of an approximately 19,904 square foot existing commercial building for the establishment of an accounting office. The estimated investment cost is \$519,582.00 (the "Project").

Pursuant to Ordinance No. 393-17, the City sold this property to Olympic Real Estate Groups, LLC in 2018. The City acquired the property in 2015 from the Lucas County Land Reutilization Corporation and had been marketing it for redevelopment for several years. As part of the agreement to sell the property, the City agreed to Community Reinvestment Area real property tax exemption for the project.

Olympic Real Estate Group LLC redeveloped the building as its commercial office space for its sister company Rahe & Company CPA's LLC dba Financial Express and Payroll Express LLC. These

related businesses have been providing accounting and tax services in Toledo for the last 25 years. The company had three offices locations scattered throughout the City of Toledo that it consolidated into this new location, thus retaining 17 full-time and 16 part-time employees. The company has added several new employees as a result of this new location.

This Project is in conformance with Toledo's Hawthorne Hills Community Reinvestment Area requirements as established by the above referenced ordinance. The Toledo Public School District has been notified pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 5709.83 of the granting of a one hundred percent (100%) twelve (12) year tax exemption. The Toledo Public School District Board has approved the terms of the CRA Agreement and has entered into a school compensation agreement with the applicant. This Ordinance is required to authorize a one hundred percent (100%) real property tax exemption for twelve (12) years for taxes that would otherwise be generated due to the increase in the assessed valuation of the real property at the project site.

Currently, The City of Toledo owns and operates five (5) municipal cemeteries throughout the city.

Forest Cemetery located at 1704 Mulberry Rd.
Collingwood Cemetery located at 703 Phillips Ave.
Maplewood Cemetery located at 3429 Airport Hwy.
Haughton Cemetery located at 3214 Central Ave.
State Line Cemetery located at 6252 Benore Rd.

Only two of these properties continue to have plots available, (Forest Cemetery and Maplewood Cemetery).

In January 2020, the city submitted a request for proposal seeking qualified applicants to develop, manage, and sell cemetery property rights, merchandise and services at all the cemeteries. The city would like to proceed with entering into a contract with Woodlawn Cemetery and Arboretum for five years with the option for a five-year renewal. The annual expenditure as part of the agreement is as follows:

The Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority approved a resolution at its March 26, 2020 Board of Directors' meeting granting \$25,000 from its Community Economic Development Initiative to the Toledo-Lucas County Plan Commission for the purpose of supporting the creation of a Strategic Framework Plan to create a strategic vision that will

address the changes and opportunities in Toledo and that will form the

basis of a new city comprehensive plan.

Ord. 6-20 authorized an agreement between the city and the Lucas County Land Reutilization Corp. (the "Lucas County Land Bank") along with \$70,000 in city funding to provide assistance in with this strategic process by acting as fiscal agent and project administrator.
