Body: WHEREAS, international, national, state, and local
governments and health authorities are responding to an outbreak of a
disease caused by the novel coronavirus referred to as COVID-19;
and

WHEREAS, the State of Ohio, the County of Lucas, and the
City of Toledo are experiencing a public health crisis from the
COVID-19 pandemic that will have lasting impacts on residents and
the economy; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Ohio Department of Health, and the Toledo-Lucas County Department of Public Health have all issued recommendations including, but not limited to social distancing, staying home if sick, canceling or postponing large group events, working from home, and other precautions to protect public health and prevent transmission of this communicable virus; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the public health emergency and the precautions recommended by health authorities, many residents and businesses in the City of Toledo have experienced or expect soon to experience sudden and unexpected income loss; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of the State of Ohio has stated that individuals exposed to COVID-19 may be temporarily unable to report to work due to illness caused by COVID-19 or quarantines related to COVID- 19 and individuals directly affected by COVID-19 may experience potential loss of income, health care and medical coverage, and ability to pay for housing and basic needs, thereby placing increased demands on already strained regional and local health and safety resources, including shelters and food banks; and

WHEREAS, further economic impacts due to the continued rise in COVID-19 cases are occurring, leaving residential tenants vulnerable to eviction after the State of Ohio and the Federal Government have lifted their stays on evictions; and

WHEREAS, during this local emergency and in the interest of protecting the public health and preventing transmission of COVID-19, it is essential to avoid unnecessary housing displacement to protect the City's affordable housing stock and to prevent housed individuals from falling into homelessness; and

WHEREAS, the City of Toledo is invested in helping to maintain occupancy during a global pandemic through a rental assistance program and other means as a way to protect all residents of the City; and

WHEREAS, unemployment compensation, rental assistance and other dollars are being made available to Ohioans so they can meet their basic needs but these dollars have been slow to make their way into people's bank accounts;

Enacting a new Section 115.05 of the Toledo Municipal Code, "Mandatory Yearly Ethics Training and Pledge of Ethical Conduct"; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Toledo City Council recognizes that the people of the City of Toledo are entitled to a responsible, fair and honest city government that operates at the highest level of ethical and moral conduct. Council also recognizes that those elected to public office have been given a public trust and that trust requires leadership in creating and sustaining a culture of ethics in the City of Toledo. Council is committed to assuring that the minimum core ethical standards established herein are adhered to in day to day practices at Toledo City Council and throughout the City. Council also recognizes that policies are most effective when members are thoroughly familiar with them and embrace their provisions. Therefore, a review of this Pledge of Ethical Conduct will be included in orientation for new council members and staff and the Pledge will be reviewed and signed annually by Council Members.

COUNCIL MEMBERS GADUS, KOMIVES AND MELDEN PRESENT:

[TMP-5380](#)**Enacting Toledo Municipal Code Section 135.04, Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing and Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice; and declaring an emergency.****Body:** SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The purpose of this Ordinance is to address the serious health, safety, and economic concerns related to fair housing, expand access to housing opportunities, and further the goals of the Fair Housing Act including residential desegregation and promotion of housing choice.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) recently promulgated regulations that reduced and/or eliminated certain obligations of entitlement jurisdictions to report on and measure their progress toward affirmatively furthering the goals of the Fair Housing Act including analyzing impediments to fair housing choice and taking proactive steps to reduce segregation and improve access to housing opportunities for protected classes recognized under Fair Housing Act. These efforts are essential to build inclusive, vibrant neighborhoods where all residents have access to the resources they need to thrive.

The City of Toledo remains committed to affirmatively furthering fair housing as originally intended in and set forth as a goal within the Fair Housing Act. *See* 42 U.S.C. 3608. The City of Toledo wishes to commit itself to continue to measure progress toward achieving the goals of the Fair Housing Act as was previously required prior to HUD's recent regulatory changes. The City intends to not only comply with HUD's newly reduced regulatory requirements, but also affirmatively further fair housing through completing an Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice along with a fair housing action plan to address the impediments identified in the analysis.

Authorizing the expenditure of \$207,500 from the Risk Management Fund to settle the plaintiff's attorney fee claim in the litigation captioned *Drewes Farm Partnership v. City of Toledo*, Case No. 3:19-cv-00434-JZ, N.D. Ohio, Western Division; authorizing an additional expenditure in an amount not to exceed \$35,000 from the Risk Management Fund to the law firm of Spengler Nathanson for the provision of professional assistance on behalf of the City of Toledo in the above-referenced litigation; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Voters participating in a special election held on February 26, 2019, passed a petition-driven amendment to the City of Toledo Charter titled Lake Erie Bill of Rights. On February 27, 2019, Drewes Farm Partnership filed a lawsuit against the City of Toledo in the U.S. District Court, Northern District of Ohio, Case No. 3:19-cv-00434-JZ, N.D. Ohio, Western Division. The lawsuit generally alleged that the Charter amendment was unconstitutional and violated Ohio and federal law. On February 27, 2020, the Court ruled that the citizen-initiated Charter amendment was unconstitutional and invalid in its entirety. In such federal cases, the Court can award reasonable attorney fees and costs to the prevailing party. Accordingly, Drewes Farms Partnership sought an award of legal fees and costs. The parties engaged in a mediation on August 19, 2020, and reached a proposed settlement on the attorney fee issue in the amount of \$207,500, contingent upon Council approval. The proposed settlement also includes the dismissal with prejudice of the motion for attorney fees and costs. Additionally, this ordinance seeks authorization of an additional \$35,000 to pay Spengler Nathanson for legal fees incurred by the City of Toledo as well as the fees and costs necessary to conclude the litigation and fee claim.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The University of Cincinnati is pleased to announce that The Toledo Fire and Rescue Department has been awarded funding from the National Institute of Health (NIH) and the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA). This funding will be used for the TFRD start-up costs to support the “Leave Behind” initiative.

EMS agencies frequently respond to 911 calls for opioid overdose or other conditions affecting people who suffer from opioid use disorder. In many cases these individuals are not transported to the hospital, but would still benefit from receiving Naloxone. TFRD will work with the HCS Ohio IC to operationalize, and implement procedures to “leave behind” Naloxone with at-risk individuals, particularly if they are not transported to an emergency department for further care.

In addition, the initiative will work on streamlining the required data collection for this project and linking this with other programs to assist with accurate and timely reporting of overdose information and Naloxone distribution.

The funds will be used to support such efforts of personnel identified as champions who will work on Leave It Behind program development and expanding program implementation including, but not limited to, training, data collection and management, reporting, and advertising. The funds may also be used for the potential, future, purchase of Naloxone or any other supplies that will directly be used to support the “Leave Behind” initiative.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Toledo Fire and Rescue Department has negotiated a lease agreement with Owens Community College to include the use of classroom and office space to provide administrative support, academy simulation skills training, educational testing, and state certification completion for TFRD personnel.

The lease agreement defines 5,834 Sq foot of space usage and provides to pay the amount not to exceed \$6,806.33 monthly for the term of the agreement. The term of this agreement will be for 24 months effective January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2022. Total expenditure amounts to \$163,351.92

Authorizing the issuance and sale of Water System Revenue Bonds of the City in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$100,000,000 for the purpose of paying costs of certain capital improvements to the City's water supply, storage and distribution system consisting of the acquisition and installation of water meters and related improvements; authorizing the execution of one or more Supplemental Indentures to supplement the Amended and Restated Trust Indenture securing outstanding water system revenue bonds of the City; authorizing and approving related matters; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The City is authorized under Article XVIII of the Constitution of the State of Ohio and the Charter of the City to: (a) own and operate the public utility referred to as the Water System (the "**Utility**"); (b) borrow money for the purpose of paying costs of improvements to the Utility and refunding outstanding obligations previously issued for that purpose; and (c) issue bonds secured by a pledge of and lien on the Net Revenues of the Utility. By Ordinance No. 345-84, passed May

15, 1984, this Council authorized an Indenture of Mortgage dated as of June 1, 1984 (the “**Original Indenture**”) to secure water system revenue bonds issued by the City. The Original Indenture was amended and restated effective as of June 1, 2003 as provided in the Amended and Restated Indenture (Fifth Supplemental Indenture), under authority of Ordinance No. 250-03 passed by this Council on April 15, 2003 (the Original Indenture, as amended by the Amended and Restated Indenture and as further amended to date, is referred to herein as the “**Indenture**”). As of July 1, 2020, the aggregate amount of bonds that the Utility has issued under the Indenture that remains outstanding is \$321,360,000 (the “**Outstanding Bonds**”).

As part of its current capital improvement and maintenance plan, the Department of Public Utilities has determined that it is necessary and desirable to acquire and install new water meters to replace the existing water meters that service the Utility and to make related improvements (collectively, the “**Improvements**”), certain of which Improvements shall also provide benefit to the City’s Sanitary Sewer System, and that it is necessary and proper and in the best interest of the City to issue revenue bonds in one or more series in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$100,000,000 (the “**Series 2020 Bonds**”) at this time under the Indenture to pay costs of the Improvements, to make any required deposits to the Debt Service Reserve Fund, to pay any capitalized interest on the Series 2020 Bonds and to pay costs of issuance of the Series 2020 Bonds.

[TMP-5378](#) **Making certain findings related to the cost-benefit analysis of the Metering Infrastructure (AMI) and Leak Detection System conducted pursuant to a contract with Johnson Controls, Inc. (JCI) as authorized by Ord. 339-18 as amended by Ord. 291-19; authorizing the mayor to enter into a contract with JCI for project management, construction and implementation of the AMI project; authorizing the appropriation from the unappropriated bond proceeds in the amount of \$43,897,291 into the Water Bond Improvement Fund and the appropriation from the unappropriated sewer bond**

proceeds in the amount of \$43,892,844 into the Sewer Bond Improvement Fund and authorizing the expenditure of same; authorizing the appropriation in an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 from the unappropriated balance of bond proceeds into the Water Bond Improvement Fund and an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 from the unappropriated balance of bond proceeds into the Sewer Bond Improvement Fund for improvements to SAP necessary to support the Project and authorizing the expenditure of the same; authorizing the expenditure of \$3,788,468 from the Utilities Administrative Services Fund over 20 years for measurement and verification service; authorizing the expenditure of funds from the Utilities Administrative Services Fund for annual software licenses; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

Ord. 339-18 as amended by Ord. 291-19 authorized a performance-based 2-phase contract with Johnson Controls, Inc. (“JCI”) for an Automated Meter Reading (AMR)/Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) and Leak Detection System (the “Project”) for the Division of Water Distribution as the lowest and best bidder. The first phase of the project has been completed. The first phase consisted of completing an American Water Works Association (AWWA) water system audit and evaluation, including leak detection analysis and meter data acquisition system (collectively “the system”) to determine the efficiency of the system and to identify improvements and operational efficiency measures; conducting a technical feasibility analysis; lifecycle cost analysis of systems and technologies; identification of system improvements that will generate a return on investment for the system; financial analysis to determine estimated savings and new revenue generation to fund improvements, technical design of system improvements. The Ordinance also authorized the execution of an amendment and addendum to the contract with JCI for implementation of the identified water system improvements upon a showing that the cost of the project will not exceed the amount of enhanced revenues and savings from operational efficiencies generated over the average life of the improvements and a benefits guarantee

from JCI.

The Project will be implemented through a performance contract to modify the city's existing domestic water meter system to include the replacements of selected water meters, the implementation of Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI), leak detection, and the interface to the existing Department of Public Utilities (DPU) billing system. The Project will improve the system's infrastructure, reduce operating costs, and provide real-time utility consumption and cost data, improve customer service, and reduce costs and response times for resolving customer issues due to improved system information. In addition to project management functions, JCI will monitor and verify that the City realizes the anticipated enhanced revenue benefits from the Project.

Ohio Revised Code section 717.02 authorizes municipalities to enter performance contracts for installation of automatic meter reading system or other construction or modifications of water utility systems. The awarding of a contract under this provision is conditioned upon a finding that the amount of money spent on improvements is not likely to exceed the amount of money the municipal corporation would save in operating, and maintenance costs over the average life of the improvements. The operational savings are projected to be approximately \$50 million and the enhanced revenue benefit is projected to be approximately \$123 million over the 20-year life of the Project, for gross benefit estimated at \$173,234,561 (net present value of \$123,925,927). Net benefit after all costs is estimated to be \$28,945,473. Additional information on the cost-benefit analysis is attached as Exhibit A.

After the completion of the analysis necessary to determine both recommended system improvements, including increase in billable revenue, the city has determined which improvements it will move forward with based on estimated returns on investment. This ordinance authorizes the contract /addendum detailing the implementation phase of the Project.

The total cost of the capital Project will not exceed the cost savings and additional revenue realized by the City over the average life of the improvements. The performance-based contract with JCI will include a guarantee from JCI that the project costs under its contract will be fully paid for over time from savings. Future appropriations will be allocated to DPU operational budgets for measurement and verification services for 20-years.

This implementation phase performance contract requires additional Council findings and authorizations.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The Department of Public Utilities (DPU), Division of Utilities Administration's check processing machine is eight years old. Now that DPU has transitioned to monthly billing, there is a need for a parallel system not only to process checks but to also serve as a backup. Since DPU processes all check payments through EFT, the acquisition of a check processing machine with digital capabilities is necessary.

Authorizing the appropriation and expenditure of bond proceeds from the Water Bond Improvement Fund in an amount not to exceed \$10,440,000; authorizing the mayor to enter into a contract renewal for the previously bid contract with URS Corporation for Professional Construction Management and Program Support Services, and other necessary work and tasks, relating to the implementation of the Capital Improvement Program for the Division of Water Treatment; waiving the competitive procurement requirements of TMC Chapter 187; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The Division of Water Treatment has identified \$500 million in needed improvements to the facilities it operates and is implementing an aggressive capital improvements program to evaluate, design, and construct projects to ensure the reliable supply of potable water to the area as well as to meet the requirements of the Ohio EPA. To assist the current engineering staff in the Division, a Professional Construction Management (PCM) team is under contract to provide program support services and to coordinate the construction administration, design review and field services activities. As the Capital Improvement Program continues to be implemented and new projects are authorized, additional funds are now necessary to renew the existing contract for Professional Construction Management and Support Services through the last four years of the capital improvement program through 2024.

This ordinance provides continued funding for Professional services that includes master program scheduling; financial, budgeting, progress and status reporting; public and MBE outreach; web based document administration; plant site stormwater pollution protection planning activities; construction administration, design review and field services, and other necessary work and tasks, relating to the implementation of the Capital Improvement Program for the Division of Water Treatment. Funding for these services is available from the Water Bond Improvement Fund (2018 Bond Issuance).

[TMP-5345](#) **Authorizing the mayor to enter into agreements for the implementation of Cityworks PLL software and other integration software programs and services as needed for the division of Building Inspection; authorizing the expenditure of \$400,000 from the Capital Improvement Fund; and declaring an emergency.**

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

This ordinance authorizes the expenditure of funds for the implementation of Cityworks PLL (permits Land and Licensing) and associated software and integration. The City owns an enterprise license of Cityworks and there is no cost for licensing. The cost is for the build out of Cityworks for the department of Building Inspections to replace the antiquated software, Accela, that they are currently using for building permits. The Cityworks software resides on the GIS

platform and has the ability to track service requests, work orders, storeroom, licenses, and inspections, which relate to assets and service requests throughout the city. The software was used by DPU originally, but has grown to include a majority of city divisions and is also tied to SeeClickFix. Adding Building Inspections into this platform with allow greater collaboration and communication between City Departments. This implementation project was competitively bid in accordance with Toledo Municipal Code Chapter 187.

Authorizing the mayor to extend participation and coverage of the City of Toledo's health care plan to the employees of the Lucas County 9-1-1 Regional Council of Government; authorizing the acceptance and depositing of proceeds for said purpose; and declaring an emergency.

Body:

SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

By the passage of Ordinance 31-20, the City Council authorized the mayor to execute an agreement to create the Lucas County 9-1-1 Regional Council of Governments ("COG"), which would consolidate

multiple public safety answering points (“PSAPs”) into a single operation and provide enhanced mutual aid and coordination among public agencies as well as create operational efficiencies resulting in cost savings for the participating jurisdictions.
