**Approving the Toledo Recovery Plan in the amount of
\$180,948,591; and declaring an emergency.**

Body:

SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

This Ordinance presents the Toledo Recovery Plan to City Council for approval. The Toledo Recovery Plan outlines the City’s comprehensive spending strategy for its \$180,948,591 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. The ARPA was signed into law in March 2021 to provide additional economic relief to address the continued impact of COVID-19. As a local government recipient of

ARPA funds, the City's expenditure of these dollars must fall under one of four eligible use categories: (1) responding to COVID-19 public health emergency or its negative economic impacts, (2) premium pay for essential workers, (3) provision of government services or (4) necessary investments in water, sewer or broadband. ARPA funds must be obligated no later than December 31, 2024 and expended by December 31, 2026.

The Toledo Recovery Plan was developed after a community engagement process, which included a community survey and public meetings. The Plan supports projects that focus on five investment areas to ensure that the needs of Toledo and its residents and businesses are met with the ARPA funding. The attached schedule A outlines the Toledo Recovery Plan by investment area and project. This Ordinance approves the Toledo Recovery Plan but does not authorize the appropriation or expenditure of any funds. Subsequent legislation will be submitted by project for appropriation and expenditure authority.

DEPARTMENT OF POLICE OPERATIONS:

Authorizing the Mayor to enter into an agreement with the Lucas County Prosecutors Office in an amount not to exceed \$120,000 for retaining the professional services of a Special Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for crime intelligence; and declaring an emergency.

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

This Ordinance approves an agreement with the Lucas County Prosecutors Office for retaining the professional services of a Special Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for crime intelligence.

This Assistant's duties will be limited to prosecutorial duties related to the United States Department of Justice Crime Intelligence Center Program grant received by the City of Toledo Police Department from the United States Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) through the

Office of Justice Programs (OJP). This agreement is funded through the grant proceeds, which were accepted and authorized for expenditure under Ordinance 495-20.

DEPARTMENT OF FIRE & RESCUE OPERATIONS:

3. [TMP-6706](#) **Authorizing the acceptance and deposit of \$356,932.73 of FEMA grant funds to the Capital Improvement Fund; authorizing the appropriation and expenditure of the same; authorizing the appropriation of \$16,629 from the Capital Improvement Fund; authorizing the expenditure of \$52,322.71 from the Capital Improvement Fund for the purchase of Lifepak 15 Cardiac Monitors and related equipment; waiving the competitive bidding requirements of TMC Chapter 187; authorizing the Mayor award contracts for said purchases; and declaring an emergency.**

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:
Toledo Fire and Rescue's expenditure request of \$409,255.44 incorporates \$356,932.73 received from a FEMA grant for Emergency Medical Services, a 10% non-federal fund grant matching condition of \$35,693.27, and an additional \$16,629.44 of CIP funding to offset related LifePak 15 Cardiac Monitor costs; whereas the total COT commitment is \$52,322.71, of which \$36,000 was previously appropriated from the Capital Improvement Fund in Ordinance 498-21 thereby facilitating the purchase of 11 Lifepak 15 Cardiac Monitors and related equipment.

4. [TMP-6689](#) **Authorizing the Mayor to accept an Ohio Statewide Search and Rescue (Water) Capability (Am. Sub. HB 166, 133th GA) Regional Grant from the Ohio Emergency Management Agency in an amount not to exceed \$8,083 for the City of Toledo, Department of Fire & Rescue Operations; authorizing the deposit, appropriation, and expenditure of funds; and declaring an emergency.**

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:
The Ohio Emergency Management Agency has awarded the Toledo

Fire and Rescue Department a Statewide Search and Rescue (Water) Capability grant not to exceed Eight Thousand Eighty-Three dollars (\$8,083). The purpose of this grant is to support search & rescue throughout the state by administering & maintaining the Ohio Fire Chiefs' Emergency Response Plan/System, which is one of the key dispatching capabilities for search and rescue teams in Ohio.

These funds will continue to build and sustain Toledo Fire's collapse search and rescue capabilities, including costs associated with team administration, equipment, expendable materials, supply purchases, vehicles, equipment maintenance, training, and similarly related activities.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SERVICE:

5. [TMP-6707](#) **Authorizing the acceptance, deposit, appropriation and expenditure of a grant in an amount not to exceed \$10,000 from Toledo Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) to facilitate planning for a natural play space in Paul William Alexander Park; and declaring an emergency.**

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:
The funds are granted by Toledo LISC to support the planning for a natural play space to be installed at Paul William Alexander Park on Superior Street. They are specifically designated to cover the costs to hold community engagement activities with the neighborhood, and will be paid out to program partners involved in the project to cover those expenses.

DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES:

6. [TMP-6714](#) **Authorizing the Mayor to enter into a Professional Services Contract with Paramount Preferred Solutions, Inc., to provide Third Party Administration (TPA) services for the City of Toledo Workers' Compensation Program; and declaring an emergency.**

Body: SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:

The City of Toledo uses a Third-Party Administrator (TPA) for its workers' compensation program. The City sought competitive proposals for this service from July 23, 2021 to August 24, 2021. Two (2) proposals were submitted by the following companies: Paramount Preferred Solutions, Inc, the City's current provider, and Matrix Claims Management, Inc. Paramount Preferred Solutions, Inc.'s bid was approximately \$65,000 lower annually than the other submitted bid. In addition to being the lowest bid, Paramount Preferred Solutions, Inc. is a locally operated company and has provided outstanding service and savings to the City since 2017.

Body:**SUMMARY & BACKGROUND:**

In the Fall of 2018, the Mayor’s Recreation Task Force concluded its report on policy recommendations regarding the City’s parks and recreation services. Included in this report was the recommendation that any person or organization working with youth as a coach or volunteer to meet minimum safety requirements, should that person or party be using City of Toledo parks or facilities or receive City of Toledo funding. Toledo City Council recognizes the need to inspire changes in youth sports to make the experience safe, positive and fun

for everyone involved. In order to realize the true value of youth sports participation and to provide a safe, positive and fun environment for youth and their families to participate, we must raise the standards among the users of our City's youth sports facilities.
