# **Body:** SUMMARY & BACKGROUND: In the Fall of 2018, the Mayor's Recreation Task Force concluded its report on policy recommendations regarding the City's parks and recreation services. Included in this report was the recommendation that any person or organization working with youth as a coach or volunteer to meet minimum safety requirements, should that person or party be using City of Toledo parks or facilities or receive City of Toledo funding. Toledo City Council recognizes the need to inspire changes in youth sports to make the experience safe, positive and fun
