
- 1. Transfer is \$8 Million (C.I.P. to General Fund)
- 2. Ten Miles of Residential Road Repaved
- 3. Rainy Day Fund Decreases from \$24 Million to \$17 Million
- 4. No New Firetrucks
- 5. No New Police Body Cameras
- 6. No Meaningful Park Improvements
- 7. Pools Open Based on Life Guard Availability
- 8. \$250,000 on Recreation Programs (1/5th of Cincinnati, ½ of Columbus)
- 9. No Lead-Safe Matching Grant
- 10. No Money for Blight Removal -- only City in Ohio




...50 years to replace streets that last only 20

The city needs something like \$1.1 billion over 20 years to fix all of its streets. That comes to \$55.5 million annually. With that kind of money, the city would be on a 20-year replacement cycle since streets typically last that long, instead of an "every-50-year replacement cycle." - THE BLADE

















State Gas Tax Revenue to Toledo is Not Enough

- \$5 Million Will Be Used to Maintain Some Current Streets
- Pays for Pothole Repair, Crack Sealing, and Patching

162,500 potholes filled this year. Gas tax money will help make these repairs, but to make long-term improvements, this money is barely a drop in the bucket.

Parks and Recreation

- Toledo spends 1/5th of what Cincinnati spends on recreation programs and 1/2 of what Columbus spends.
- 83% of what we do spend on Parks is grass mowing



OUR PAST

- On June 8, 1982, the voters of Toledo enacted a new 0.75% income tax
- It generated \$22M at the time (\$58M inflation adj.)
- It was going to be spent on roads, infrastructure, police, and averting budget disaster
- It passed with 62% of the vote





THE 3/4% INCOME TAX

- No matter what happens, Toledo must renew the ¾% income tax in 2020
- But we can do better...



- We're recommending a 1.25% income tax to replace the 0.75% tax
- General Fund 0.75% of the tax (0.25% new money)
- Capital Improvement Fund 0.50% of the tax (0.25% new money)
- Segregated funding by law capital improvement funds cannot be used to support general fund operations



Ballot Language

Shall the ordinance (Ordinance No. xxx-19) repealing the City's temporary threequarters percent (3/4%) municipal income tax levy effective July 1, 2020 and enacting a one and one-quarter percent $(1\frac{1}{4}\%)$ levy on income for the period commencing on July 1, 2020 and ending December 31, 2030, and allocating forty percent (40%) of the proceeds of that levy for the purposes of improving city roads, residential streets, sidewalks and meeting other public infrastructure and municipal capital needs, **and** prohibiting any transfer of such proceeds for General Fund purposes, and allocating sixty percent (60%) of the levy proceeds for General Fund purposes of providing police and fire protection, parks and recreation services and other general municipal operations, and to support pre-kindergarten education for residents of the City, which levy shall continue to be in addition to the City's one percent and one-half percent levies on income that are in effect for a continuing period of time, be passed?



- Generates a new \$44M per year in total
- General Fund a new \$22M per year
- Capital Improvement Fund a new \$22M per year



In the **Capital Improvements Fund**, the new annual \$22M is bonded and leveraged over 10 years for new annual spending of:

\$40M \$20M Residential road projects

Police cars, fire trucks, park equipment,

building repairs, blight elimination

\$600M of investment over 10 years





In the **General Fund**, the new **Annual \$22M** is spent this way:

\$14 Million in New Services

\$8 Million for budget Stabilization

- \$3M Annual police class (40 officers)
- \$3M Annual fire class (40 officers)
- \$1.5M Recreation for youth & parks investment
- \$1.5M Neighborhood Stabilization
- \$5 M Universal Pre-K









Invest in Roads:

- 45 times increase in residential road miles annually resurfaced or reconstructed (1.6 miles in 2019 vs. 72.8 in 2021)
- \$400 million of residential road investment over 10 years
- No more short term fixes a majority of roads reconstructed so they last for a generation (55% reconstructed, 45% resurfaced)
- Continued investment in major streets too



Invest in Safety:

- Guaranteed police & fire classes annually to grow our forces including a net 100 officer increase by 2023
- 50 new police cars each year
- Three new firetrucks per year & major ongoing repairs to fire stations
- Body cameras for every uniformed officer to keep them safe and ensure accountability
- Blight removal of abandoned buildings where crime festers



Invest in Our Future

- All City pools guaranteed to stay open from Memorial Day to Labor Day
- Millions invested in every major city park new shelters, new courts, new fields, and more
- Ensure that every Toledo child has access to sports & recreation
- A lead-safe investment fund to help owners and small landlords make necessary repairs
- A public-private partnership to deliver universal preschool to every 4year old in Toledo



Invest in Toledo will deliver:

- \$40M (10x increase) each year for residential roads (\$400M for 10 years)
- A growing police & fire force to keep our neighborhoods safe
- Millions of dollars of investment for our youth and quality of life
- A balanced city budget without any need to transfer from the capital fund
- A budget stabilization fund that grows to \$40M, a responsible benchmark
- A stabilized or improved Toledo bond rating reducing interest costs
