Update on ARPA Rules & Guidance

What have we learned so far?

ARPA is funding to local and state governments to support struggles caused by or exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Recovery is fiscal recovery for the city, a healthier community, and a stronger constituency. Funding is more targeted than initially expected.

ARPA emphasizes equity, addressing the root causes of poverty and building wealth within communities of color.



Investment

\$180,948,591 allocated to Toledo

Provided in two installments

- First installment of \$90,474,295.50 received in May 2021.
- Second installment of \$90,474,295.50 application opens May 2022.

Funds must be obligated beginning **3/3/2021** through **12/31/2024**

Funds must be spent by **December 31, 2026**



Rule-making

The Interim Final Rule from Treasury was released on **Thursday, May 10, 2021**.

- Compliance Guidance released on Thursday, June 17, 2021.
- Comments on the Interim Rule due by Friday, July 16, 2021.
- Expectation of a Final Rule from Treasury in **fall 2021.**

Final Rule may clarify or modify proposed requirements, and add new explicit eligible uses for the funds.



- Municipal Revenue Loss.
- Premium Pay.
- Water and Sewer and Broadband Infrastructure.
- Responding to the Public Health Emergency and Its Economic Impacts.



Prohibited Uses

- Rainy day fund contributions.
- Repayment of existing debt service.
- Legal settlements.
- Fees and costs associated with new debt issuances.



Municipal Revenue Loss


Can be spent on: any general government services; "Broad latitude"

Rules

- Base line revenue is **December 31, 2019** (2019 fiscal year).
- Revenue is classified as general revenue, but not any of the following:
 - utility, enterprise, unemployment rebates, CARES Act, etc.
- ARPA assumes annual municipal revenue growth of 4.1%
- **Municipal revenue loss** equals the difference between assumed revenue and actual revenue in that year, calculated four times.

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• 12/31/2020 - 12/31/2021 - 12/31/2022 - 12/31/2023
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Municipal Revenue Loss



Premium Pay

Can be given towards: Wages to workers performing essential work during emergency

Rules

- Essential work involves regular in-person interactions or regular physical handling of items also handled by others.
- Premium pay must add to an essential worker's already existing wages.
- Workers engaged in telework from a residence did not perform essential work.



Water, Sewer, Broadband Infrastructure

Can be used on investments in water and sewer infrastructure, including privately-owned infrastructure; projects that deliver broadband speeds of 100 Mbps; "wide latitude"


Rules

Aligns eligible uses in this category with US EPA's Clean Water State Revolving Fund and Drinking Water State Revolving Fund.

- **Wastewater:** wastewater plant improvements, address non-point pollution sources, stormwater management, replacement of lead service lines, protect water bodies from pollution.
- **Climate change:** improve the resilience of infrastructure due to climate changes, green infrastructure.
- **Clean water:** address drinking water treatment and distribution systems
- Broadband projects must focus on unserved or underserved locations

Responding to the Public Health Emergency

Eligible uses include:

- Measures to counter the spread of COVID-19.
- Provision of care for those impacted by COVID-19.
- Programs or services addressing disparities in public health exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, such as:
 - Vaccination Programs
 - Testing
 - Contact Tracing
 - PPE
 - Support for Schools
 - Ventilation
 - Enhanced Data Systems

- Capital Investments to Improve Public Health
- Behavioral Health Care
- Community Health Workers
- Public Benefit Navigators
- Housing services to support healthy neighborhoods
- Remediation of lead paint
- · Evidence-based community violence interventions



Responding to the Negative Economic Impacts

Must identify:

- 1. An economic harm, like loss of earnings, resulting from COVID emergency;
- 2. Explain how the program, service, or intervention addresses that harm now or over time.

Presumed Eligible Uses:

Assistance to Households

- Food Assistance
- Rent, Mortgage, Utility Assistance
- Homelessness Prevention
- Emergency Home Repairs
- Weatherization
- Internet Access
- Job Training

Assistance to Business

- Loans or grants to offset losses
- Capital improvements
- Technical assistance
- Aid to hospitality / tourism
- Can presume eligible if a small business or business serving a disadvantaged area



Responding to the Negative Economic Impacts

Must identify:

- 1. An economic harm, such as a loss of earnings, resulting from COVID emergency;
- 2. Explain how the program, service, or intervention addresses that harm now or over time.

Presumed Eligible Uses

Address Housing Disparities

- Services to address homelessness
- Affordable housing development to increase units
- Housing vouchers to help LMI individuals move to areas of greater opportunity

Address Educational Disparities

- New / expanded pre-K, Head Start, partnerships
- Equitable funding to high-poverty districts
- Evidence-based schooling programming
- High-quality child care



Recipients & Sub recipients

The City may deliver all ARPA services itself as the recipient.

The City may also make awards to sub-recipients if they are:

- A special-purpose unit of state or local government
- A non-profit organization
- Another unit of local government (county, city, village, school district) & vice versa
- A private entity (in authorized contexts)

The City is responsible for monitoring and reporting on a sub recipient's use of ARPA funds to ensure full compliance.



Reporting

Quarterly Project & Expenditures Reports through 12/31/2026

- All ARPA funded projects
- All investments in eligible city services
- Current and cumulative financial obligations for these investments
- Status of the project
- Demographics of the individuals served by the project
- Sub-recipient awards
- Civil Rights compliance and programmatic data



Reporting

Annual Recovery Plan Performance Report through 12/2026

- Executive summary
- Overall use of funds in ARPA eligible expenditure categories
- Promotion of equitable outcomes
- Community engagement
- Labor practices
- Use of evidence-based interventions
- Table of projects and expenditures
- Key performance indicators achieved

The Task Force

City of Toledo Recovery Task Force

- 3 Members of appointed by Mayor Kapszukiewicz
- 3 Members of Toledo City Council (Williams, Melden, Moline)
- Representatives of Finance and Law
- Utilizing SMART analysis

The Task Force is charged with developing a Toledo Recovery Plan framework with input from the City's residents, businesses, and stakeholders, and delivering a Toledo Recovery Plan that can be adopted by the City Council and the Mayor.



Compliance Support

Recovery Plan Staffing

- Two positions will be posted for ARPA compliance support
- 1 ARPA Compliance Attorney in the Law Department
- 1 ARPA Financial Compliance position in the Finance Department
- Other positions posted as needed and if prudent
- Goal to fill positions by early 3rd quarter 2021

Timeline

July 15	News Conference to Launch Community Engagement Plan.
By August 31	Receive Completed Surveys Host and Facilitate Citywide Meetings Receive Directors' Internal Planning proposals
September	Report Engagement Results to City Council. Consider joint sub-recipient process with Lucas Co. <i>Final Rule from Treasury may be released.</i>
October	The Task Force presents the Toledo Recovery Plan publicly.
Thereafter	Accelerate COVID-19 pandemic recovery through implementation of the Toledo Recovery Plan!
